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## John Dunicliff's concern about dogmatism

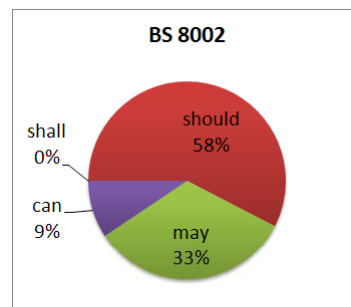
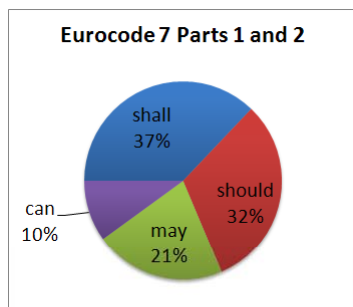
Dogmatism must not be used where engineering tasks require judgement

Therefore the word 'shall' must be avoided for these tasks

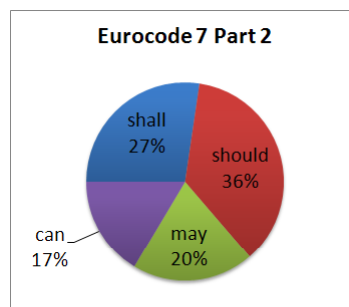
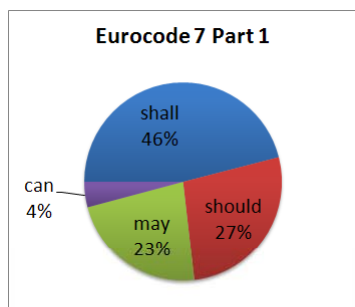
There is a need to review this aspect of Eurocodes and change 'shall' to 'should', 'may', 'can', or 'might', as appropriate
